OLD BUSINESS

EPA LETTER

Supervisor Foe reported that the Town missed a reporting deadline with the EPA with regard to lead pipes in the Town. This is a result of the Town applying for and believing they had a 6-month extension; the extension did not happen. The Town negotiated with the EPA and are now in compliance. There are 7 houses that the Town is unsure whether or not they have lead pipes. These homes are located on Fairview Dr. The Town is sure there is no lead because the earliest service of the waterlines were installed in 1963 and lead services were discontinued being run into houses by then.

The Town will be sending all homeowners indicated the deadline that was missed and what the Town's reconciliation plan is. These will be sent out 10/10/2025.

LANGWORTHY RESOLUTION - HOME HEATING CHOICE

TOWN OF CAMBRIA A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF CONGRESSMAN NICK LANGWORTHY'S ENERGY CHOICE ACT (H.R. 3699, S. 1945) AND IN OPPOSITION TO GOVERNMENT-MANDATED NATURAL GAS BANS

WHEREAS, affordable and reliable energy is essential to the health, safety, and economic prosperity of New York families, businesses, and communities; and

WHEREAS, natural gas remains a dependable, cost—effective, and clean-burning energy source used by millions of New Yorkers to heat their homes, cook their food, and power their businesses; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, New York State enacted the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA), which mandates aggressive emissions reductions and serves as the foundation for sweeping energy restrictions, including efforts to phase out natural gas; and

WHEREAS, building 0n the CLCPA, Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature in 2023 enacted provisions in the state budget banning natural gas and other fossil fuel hookups in most new residential and commercial buildings, effective 2026 for smaller buildings, and 2029 for larger buildings, thereby eliminating consumer choice and limiting access to affordable energy; and

WHEREAS, Governor Hochul has publicly supported these bans and related measures as part of her administration's climate and energy agenda, despite widespread concerns that such mandates will increase costs, strain grid reliability, and restrict energy diversity; and

WHEREAS, these top—down policies undermine affordability, threaten reliability during peak demand, and strip away the freedom of consumers and businesses to choose the energy sources that best meet their needs; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Nick Langworthy of New York and Senator Jim Justice of West Virginia introduced the Energy Choice Act (HR. 3699, S. 1945), federal legislation that ensures state and local governments cannot restrict consumer access to natural gas and other affordable energy sources, thereby protecting freedom of choice for New Yorkers and all Americans; and

WHEREAS, the Energy Choice Act would safeguard households, small businesses, hospitals farmers, and manufacturers from harmful government overreach and preserve access to an "all- of—the-above" energy strategy that strengthens reliability and affordability;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the TOWN OF CAMBRIA TOWN BOARD strongly supports the Energy Choice Act as introduced by Congressman Langworthy (H R 3699) and Senator Justice (S. 1945) and stands firmly opposed to New York State's natural gas bans, the CLCPA—driven restrictions, and other state energy mandates that eliminate consumer choice; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Cambria Town Board urges Congress to pass the Energy Choice Act to defend consumer choice, protect energy affordability, and preserve reliable access to natural gas for New Yorkers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to Congressman Nick Langworthy, Senator Jim Justice, the New York Congressional Delegation, Senators Chuck Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, Governor Kathy Hochul, and leadership of the New York State Legislature.

Upon a motion duly made by Councilman Musall and seconded by Councilwoman Brachmann, it was resolved to approve the resolution in support of Congressman Nick Langworthy's Energy Choice Act (H.R. 3699, s. 1945) and in opposition to Government-Mandated Natural Gas Bans.

ADDITIONAL MATTERS

Councilman Foe reported that at the Monday work meeting there was a discussion with the person who is attempting to purchase property on Unicorn Drive. They would like to construct 140 or so town homes. The sale has not been completed; it has been since 12/6/2024. Supervisor Foe indicated the Town would like its money, and as a taxpayer he feels it is inappropriate for someone to expect the Town of Cambria to be a bank to the tune of approximately \$440,000.00. The Town's attorney will be in contact with the purchaser's attorney.

Cambria.com will be moving to Cambria.gov:

The paperwork is complete; waiting on the .gov, will take 60 to 90 days.

CONCERNS OF THE CITIZENS

Dave Godfrey – Legislator reported on the following:

SOLAR-It is unfortunate; everyone fought so hard to keep the solar project out of Cambria. Albany has been pushing for a long time and there is no fighting it. The county will do its best to make sure the people in the community are protected.

BUDGET-The County has the worst budget in a long time but working on it the best they can.

EMS- The ambulance is doing very well. Average of 13-minute response and exceeded all of 2024's calls and will almost double that by the end of the year. Looking into a single rig on the night shift.

DREDGING INITIATIVE- This is to keep the harbors open. There are 19 small draft harbors on the south shore lake and five counties that are signed up at the county's expense to keep them open. Niagara County harbors alone generate \$60,000,000.00 in sales tax revenue. This revenue comes into the county and then goes to the towns. Outside of the air base it is the largest tax generator in Niagara County.

Supervisor Foe asked Mr. Godfrey if the rule is still in effect that there will have to be upfront money for the disposal of solar panels. Mr. Godfrey indicated that yes, this is the case at the end of life. That is established based

on the number of panels and it is the manufacturer's responsibility not the builder. If they do not have the money upfront, they can be fined \$100.00 per day per panel. There is a vehicle in place for reinforcement.

Duncan Ross-Townline Rd.

Mr. Ross asked who controls the money coming in from the solar plants.

Mr. Godfrey indicated that the money would go to the county.

Roger Palmer-Subbera Rd.

Mr. Palmer asked Mr. Godfrey if the solar company has contacted the county yet.

Mr. Godfrey indicated they have not.

Karen Kurczynski- Saunders Sttmt. Rd.

Ms. Kurczynski was present to voice her continued concerns with the proposed solar project and its effect on the surrounding land, rain/water runoff and wildlife. Her home will be surrounded by solar panels on 3 sides. Also concerned about plans in case of fire. Ms. Kurczynski also mentioned the mess surrounding the solar panels on Summit St. in Lockport and hopes the ones in Cambria will be maintained.

Tom Gertz- Saunders Sttmt. Rd.

Mr. Gertz reported that local solar fields are not working out the way expected and a lot of the money is going down the drain. He asked the Town Board if anyone was for this solar project in Cambria.

None of the Town Board is for the solar project.

Mr. Platt, Town Attorney indicated that he was not the attorney on that case. Lipus Mathias represented the Town and has for many years. Very few municipalities the size of Cambria tried the fight, and Cambria took it to the end. The hail Mary hope was that maybe in Rochester in the appellate division there would be a split and the court of appeals would agree to take up the case. Because they did not go the Town's way, the Court of Appeals, the highest court in NY, declined to hear the appeal. This is the end of the legal road. Very few municipalities even took the chance to push back; Cambria fought hard for a long time.

Duncan Ross-Townline Rd.

Mr. Ross asked when the solar money comes into the Town, what will it be used for.

Supervisor Foe indicated that until the Town determines how much is available, he cannot answer that question. It will be used for public good. The Town will not tax and spend.

Charlotte Patterson- Townline Rd.

Ms. Patterson asked if the Town Board will be keeping two building inspectors in the office. Mr. MacSwan indicated to her that the reason Mr. McCann is staying on is because Matt needed help with the Unicorn Drive project. Ms. Patterson indicated that it sounded as if Mr. MacSwan thought the Unicorn Project was a little further along than it was or will ever be. She wanted to confirm what he said vs. what may be the truth.

Supervisor Foe indicated that it is a personnel issue that the Town Board will be taking up. There should be some answers within a month or two.

Alora Brusino- Burch Rd.

Ms. Brusino asked when people will be contacted if they have applied for one of the committees and how will they be contacted.

Supervisor Foe is leaving that up to the interviewers and he would think the contact would be by phone within the next week.

Mary Brenzel-Thrall Rd.

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Ms. Brenzel asked the Town Board how the public will know about the work meeting content if the information via minutes is not posted prior to the regular Town Board meeting.

Supervisor Foe encourages everyone who is able, attend those meetings.

Duncan Ross suggested technology tools that can be used for transcription of the minutes.

Charlotte Patterson asked if the Town would ever be interested in doing live streaming.

Supervisor Foe couldn't answer that question at that time, but perhaps in the future.

Johnathan Strassheim-Plank Rd.

Mr. Strassheim indicated that there is a serious problem on his road with cars speeding. People are using that road as a cut off. He feels that the average speed is 60 MPH in a 45 MPH.

Supervisor Foe requested that Mr. Kroening, Highway Superintendent, contact the Sheriffs Department to be more active in that area.
