November meeting Design Studio

Our November Design Studio showed off what talent and expertise we have in our club. Mark Arpag, Harvey Carapella and Jim Dolce led this session. Each of our experts carefully studied the trees (Harvey caught each tree as it came through the door and did his studying in advance!) Rather than offer opinions from the get go, they usually started by asking the club member their thoughts about the tree, and then went from there. For some of the trees, the advice was in general agreement from all 3 of the leaders. Occasionally there was some controversy: did you know that a branch could be "disturbing"?!

Many thanks to Toby for bringing 2 trees that he brought last year, WITH drawings from last year so that we could see the progress. All agreed that this level of follow up and progress is very educational. The crowd was very light, we think due to the weather, which means many people missed a great opportunity to learn from masters. We hope everyone will put this on their calendars for next year to get maximum value from YOUR club dues!

Shohin Bonsai Variety Sargent Dwarf Crabapple

Mark Arpag acquired this tree over 30 years ago. It was created from a cutting by Bill Valavanis. Mark has been developing it for many years in a teaspoon or two of bonsai soil. When developing a young tree, especially a cutting, larger training pots are commonly used to help with more growth and faster development, even though it's not aesthetically pleasing.

#1 was its first bonsai pot. It is a quiet Green pot that harmonizes nicely with the tree and stone. The right side branch is the same length as the left side - I would shorten it.

#2 was the next pot in its yearly repotting schedule. I feel the pot was too small for the heavy mass of foliage and stone together, they overpower the pot. The length of the right and left branches is better. The pot is a guiet color again.


#3 The tree has developed a lot more foliage and has become a cascade rather than a semi-cascade. The foliage could be thinned out to create some negative spaces. The bright Blue pot is more dramatic and balances the mass of the stone and tree.


#4 The current pot is very decorative, very common with shohin bonsai and complements the stone and tree combination nicely. It works because the color of the stone is the same as the background color of the pot.

#5 I would prune the right side ranch back to highlight the front of the stone. Also prune the back branch so there is a small amount of foliage behind the stone for depth. Now there is a nice balance between all 3 elements and feels more like a Semi Cascade style and it's not crowding the pot anymore.
