How to be a part of the U.S. National Exhibition

This is a BIG show, with LOTS of moving parts. And you can see from the quotes on the previous page, and also in the brochure for the Exhibition, the show is very well respected on an International level. There are many opportunities for you to help make it happen. It takes more than a village to raise this child, and we want your participation. We are hoping that you will sign up for art least a few of the opportunities. To indicate your willingness to help, send an email to Bill Valavanis and Marti Macinski.

This is from the Billboard after the last show, and will give you an idea of everything that goes on: Wow!!! What an experience! A whirlwind of trees, stones, kusamono, pots and people - all coming together to share their love of the art form of Bonsai. Our club was a sponsor in so many ways: funding support and lots of physical labor and moral support. We collectively arranged more than 350 tables, loaded, unloaded and built the infrastructure, ironed curtains, hung skirting, covered tables, hung curtains and bunting, arranged gold tassels, placed bonsai trees, companion plantings and suiseki, moved trees to be photographed and moved them back, watered, and then took everything apart and back to Bill's. Many of us will have to buy the Commemorative Album to see everything, because we missed it while it was happening. It was exciting to watch all the Exhibitors and Vendors express their appreciation and gratitude to Bill and his volunteers for putting the show together.

Here is the day by day list of opportunities to help:

Monday, September 4 (yes, that's Labor Day) - be at International Bonsai Arboretum at 9:30 am to load the truck with many of the display structures for the show. If you have a truck and can make it available on Monday and Tuesday, to load and unload, that is very helpful.

Tuesday, September 5 - 9:30 am. Drive from IBA to Total Sports Experience, 435 West Commercial Street, in East Rochester, and unload all the display structures. Probably half a day.

Wednesday, September 6 - all day, starting at 9 am. Help place tables and framing, iron and hang curtains and bunting to set up the show. No experience is required for this, but a strong back is helpful.

Thursday, September 7 - all day, starting at 9 am. Finish placing tables, curtains and all structures in the morning. Trees begin to arrive in the afternoon. Help unload trees and vendors. We also need a few people to help with moving trees in and out of place to be photographed for the commemorative album.

Friday, September 8 - 9 am until noon. Help finishing placement of tables, trees, vendors, curtains and more. Everyone is kicked out at noon for the judging to begin. We also need a few people to help with moving trees in and out of place to be photographed for the commemorative album.

Saturday, September 9 - 9 am until 5. Help direct visitors and watch trees, which also involves "security" in the form of preventing people from touching the trees. We also need a few people to help with moving trees in and out of place to be photographed for the commemorative album.

Sunday, September 10 - 9 am until 4 pm. Same as Saturday. AND we need a few people to help break down the displays, load trucks, and deliver everything back to IBA. It would also be helpful to have 3-5 people at IBA on Monday morning to unload and put everything away

Mame Shohin Bonsai, Japanese Winterberry, Cherry, Serissa, Princess Pussy Willow, Weeping Forsythia, Japanese White Pine and Spindle Tree

A great use of Seedlings and Cuttings, without having to wait for a long period of time. These are interesting examples of Thimble Size Mame Bonsai, but this size bonsai are very difficult to keep alive. Let them dry out for only one day or less and they probably will be dead or almost dead. A few ways to avoid that problem are:

- Use a tray with a half to an inch of aquarium gravel to set the Mame Bonsai on top of, fill the tray with water, the gravel will keep the trees out of the water, but supplies plenty of humidity and some water will wick up in to the small pots.
- Similar idea, use a wet piece of outdoor carpet to set the trees on, it will supply plenty of humidity and some water will wick up in to the small pots or substitute the aquarium gravel with the carpet in a tray.
- 3. Use small plastic pots with wet bonsai soil in them, set the Mame Bonsai pots on top of the soil, it will supply plenty of humidity and some water will wick up in to the small pots. This method is also good for keeping the tree and pot from blowing over, the sides of the plastic pot will hold up the small trees.
