Special extra June meeting

Young Choe is a kusamono artist who studied traditional art, ink painting and calligraphy in her native Korea before she moved to the United States. With her BS horticultural degree she currently works at the US National Arboretum, in Washington, DC. While volunteering at the National Bonsai & Penjing Museum she was able to bring her artistic talent together with her horticultural knowledge to create kusamono. Ms. Choe traveled to Japan to study this unique and little-known art form with Keiko Yamane, the leading kusamono artist in Japan and former student of Saburo Kato. Ms. Choe worked with native plants at the USDA, NRCS, National Plant Materials Center in Beltsville, MD and was also a propagation horticulturist at the US National Arboretum. Together with her artistic background and solid understanding of plant material she has become the leading kusamono artist outside Japan. She now travels around the world sharing her love of kusamono through lecture/demonstrations, workshops and exhibit. Her talent and artistry will be part of the upcoming US National Bonsai Exhibition.



We have a unique opportunity to preview her art at a special meeting on *Sunday, June 13, at 6:30 pm*. She will share her work with kusamono - roughly translated as "grass thing" - and she will show us how beautiful even weeds can be when treated with respect and artistry.

May meeting report



Sean Smith was our featured presenter in May, and everyone will agree that his presentation was entertaining and instructive. After an introduction by Ron Maggio, who described Sean as “the best Diaza maker outside of Japan,” Sean went to work to broaden our understanding of Suiseki.



He describes himself as a carpenter who turned to Bonsai and then to Suiseki. His description of Bill’s critique of some of the first tables he made was vivid and very funny.

Sean explained that Suiseki means water stone, and that most of the stones are found in and around water. Suiseki is a very personal art form, and that something about the stone intrigues the artist who collects the stone. Most stones represent something in nature. Stones



are displayed in a dish with water and sand in the summer, and on a diaza in the winter. One interesting point made is that originally the Japanese did not display Bonsai inside a tea house or room, because they were thought of as a dirty garden plant.

Suiseki collecting develops over time, and everyone who does it becomes pickier as the eye becomes better with practice. Clearly, Sean’s eyes have had a lot of practice. Generally the stones are dark, and Suiseki are often displayed with tenpei and tenkei to give context. “Tenpei” and “Tenkei” are little objects such as a fisherman, a temple, or an animal, which help to explain the scene set by the Suiseki. “In Japan, everything has a story” according to Sean.



Sean went into great detail on the Kiri Baku, or storage container, for the Suiseki. We learned about the wood, and the convention for labeling the stone and the owner.



Everyone learned something from Sean’s presentation, and the raffle tickets sold well. Theresa, our newest member, won the raffle. She’ll be able to display her Suiseki along with the Spruce tree from Boon, which she won last month.

During the day, Sean offered a two part workshop where students learned to create their own diaza, for the stone they received as part of the workshop. This was not just a “how to” session, as Sean interspersed history, art and culture into the workshop. He also provided valuable insight into tools, stain, and finishing the diazas. In the afternoon the workshop focused on creating a Kiri Baku (storage box) for their Suiseki. And again, lots of background information went along with the “how to” portion.

SHOHIN BONSAI FEATURE OF THE MONTH



Shohin Bonsai, Shimpaku Juniper

This tree needs a visual aid to make sense of my comments, so I altered the original photo with my suggested changes. The original has the Gray background. I feel it is out of balance in two main ways. One, the deadwood is massive, it's very sculptural and I feel it's the main reason this tree was created, to showcase the beautiful movement, shape and depth of the deadwood, but it over powers the foliage. Two, it leans to the right a little too much lowering the foliage and making it look and feel out of balance, like it's going to fall over. My changes with the Black background are subtle changes, but I feel they make a big difference. I centered the tree in the pot, I made the tree a little more upright, which raises the foliage up, and added a little more foliage. I feel the changes puts the tree in better balance, and makes the foliage a more important part of the tree's design. The Red pot is a Direct Complimentary color combination with the Green foliage creating color contrast. The dramatic shape of the pot compliments the dramatic deadwood.
