On **May 18th and 19th** we will be having our Annual Spring Show at the **Monroe Community Hospital**. Our two featured demonstrations for the Spring show this year will be our own **Mark Arpag** on **Saturday 18th** and accredited teachers of **Ikebana International** with Jerome Cushman and Karen Napoli on **Sunday 19th**. Both talks with demos will be at 2:00 pm.

There will be a display of **Suiseki** (viewing stones) by the **Upstate New York Suiseki Study Group**, and **Ikebana International Chapter 53**.

About Demo #1: **Mark Arpag** has been a member of the Bonsai Society of Upstate New York for 27 years and is our current President. He is a long time student of Wm. N. Valavanis and teaching assistant at the International Bonsai Arboretum. His Bonsai have been displayed in all 6 US National Exhibitions and the Artisans Cup. Mark has received a number of National and Regional Awards as well as photographs featured in a number of Bonsai books and magazines.

About Demo #2: **Ikebana International Rochester Chapter** has been in existence since 1961 and its members have a common bond of love of flowers and a passion for the Japanese art of flower arrangement. They uphold the motto of Ikebana International, which is: "*Friendship through flowers.*"

Special Display of Masterpiece Forest and Rock Plantings! The trees will come from private Bonsai Collections of Bonsai Society of Upstate New York Inc members. Virtually any material can be used in the preparation of a forest planting. Usually the same material is used throughout. This assists in the horticultural maintenance of the planting. Mixed forests can be done Particularly recommended are: Beech, Birch, Cryptomeria, Elms, Zelkova, Hornbeam, Juniper, Larch, Euonymous and Maples.

Bonsai Trees Season Planner -SPRING-

Spring is perhaps the most exciting time of the year for the bonsai enthusiast. This is the time when plans and dreams can be acted upon and enthusiasm is at its greatest. The trees come back to life with a burst of energy and promise. Buds open, leaves and shoots emerge looking fresh and green. This is the busiest time of the year and there is much to be done.

- Repot trees - now is the perfect time to improve a tree's appearance by giving it that special pot
- Protect freshly repotted and tender trees from strong winds, and rain
- Lift trees that you previously earmarked for collecting last year and search for others
- Check garden centers for the arrival of any new stocks of trees and examine carefully before purchase, especially the root and base structure
- Trees will require watering more frequently as the weather warms, as the roots and foliage begin to grow rapidly.
- Style potential material that has an established root system, protecting from frosts
- Prune out any dead branches or twigs as they become apparent
- Structural pruning can be carried out, but avoid large branch removal, at this stage and attention
- Repot and prepare all accent plants....You can now look forward to Summer.

April Meeting Highlights

At our April meeting **Bill Valavanis** presented an educational bonsai program on **Japanese Black Pine**. First, Bill showed many pictures of some great looking Black Pines while including information on: Growth Characteristics, Winter Hardiness, Sources, Styles, Pruning and Training. Bill provided two very good handouts of information to take home. Several members brought their trained and in training Japanese Black Pine bonsai for the display table to illustrate techniques.

Over **55** members and guests attended our meeting, several of them from Buffalo, Syracuse, Ithaca (including one Cornell professor), Erie, and Williamsport, PA (about 3 hours away), as well as members from the surrounding Rochester area. The winner of the demo tree raffle was **Martha Macinski**.

After the demonstration six members participated in a workshop with Bill using pre-trained Japanese Black Pines. The students created the basic shapes and did the initial wiring. They will complete the wiring and bring the trees back to Bill for final touch adjustments at a later date. Some members stayed to observe, comment, and ask questions. Black Pines have very good bark characteristics and can grow very thick. The bark tends to be a lot harder and does not flake off as easy. Everyone seemed to enjoy the program and some excellent questions were asked.

It's That Time Of The Year Again...

Spring has finally arrived! Maples and flowering trees are starting to leaf out and bloom. By now, all your outdoor, winter-hardy bonsai should be outside in the full sun. If they are showing small leaves already then it's a good sign that they made it through the winter in good condition. But, it's too early to be sure.

Winter damage does not always show up until the really hot weather arrives in June. Be sure to protect bonsai that are in full leaf from sudden cold. The key temperature I look for is 25° F but 30° F is safer. If the temperature threatens to drop below what you feel comfortable with, then move your bonsai indoors for the night, then move them back out the next morning. It's a big job, but it's worth it to save the bonsai.

Members have lost some trees when fooled by the weather (and the weathermen) into leaving them out when they should have come in. At this time of year, it is best to just reconcile yourself to a lot of running in and out with trees. By now, my watering is a daily task, usually about 3-4PM. Flowering bonsai require more water than conifers. Bonsai that have been recently transplanted will not require too much water, but do need extra protection from wind and for the first few days, from too much sun. Misting helps newly transplanted bonsai. If deciduous species have not leafed out by the time you transplant, you can put them directly in the full sun, but watch out for wind. Start thinking about fertilizing, but just think for now. I will include some tips on fertilizer soon. The next three to four weeks are the most active and fun for bonsai enthusiast. Ninety percent of my transplanting and new bonsai creations are done now, so I have to go, because, **It's that time of the year... W.N.V.**


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
How to use the DOODLE Calendar


