



Library update from Joe Lentner

As we move into Autumn things begin to slow down on our Bonsai benches. I would recommend you take a little time to review some of the holdings in our library. Now is the time to investigate trees that you might acquire next year. We have material that should appeal to both the novice, intermediate and experienced Bonsai enthusiast.

For the experienced practitioner using the many catalogs from Japanese shows may inspire new styling decisions and help in planning changes in your future. While many of us may not read Japanese, it doesn't take a linguist to appreciate fine art and these catalogs are filled with fine living art. As we progress in our artistic development it never hurts to study the "masters."

The intermediate Bonsai hobbyists will find a wealth of information in the library for species they have never worked with. Perhaps you want to develop new deciduous trees not in your experience, chances are we have information to help you. As you plan for next Spring's show the books in our library may help with planning how you can best display your trees.

Novices to Bonsai have the ability to learn more with each page in a variety of books in our library. While it is often believed that you can learn from the internet, how proficient is the poster when he/she talks about your favorite tree? You can both fact check and get reliable information as you progress in developing your skills. Yes, you still have to wire, prune and pot to develop your Bonsai skills but you'll have a wealth of information available to better understand what and why you do certain things to successfully develop your trees. In addition to tree information the library has help with developing Japanese gardens, moss, companion plants, combatting diseases, even insights to Japanese culture. The library is one of the benefits of membership, make use of it as you spend those cold winter nights thinking about your Bonsai and wishing for Spring to arrive.

Finally, a review of a new acquisition to our library:

The Little Book of Bonsai by Matthew Puntigam (Not the one by Jonas Dupuich)

While it covers the basics (that we all have become familiar with), the real value is in coverage of 50 popular varieties of Bonsai. Light, moisture, temperature and soil requirements for each species are all given in short one page summaries. It's a book well worth checking out when you're at the meeting.

Remember books can be checked out without charge and are available for one month's reading. Overdue books carry a charge of \$1.00 per month but may be renewed if there is no immediate request for the title. While the available books are rotated for display at each

month's meeting any individual title can be requested (a week in advance or at the meeting) and will be brought to the next meeting for your convenience.



International Bonsai Arboretum Classes and workshops

Many of our newer members have not yet had the opportunity to experience beginner classes at International Bonsai Arboretum. The flier will be attached to the same email that forwards this Billboard, and those who have not yet take these classes should seriously consider signing up. You can choose between Monday evening and Saturday morning. You will receive a wealth of knowledge, you'll have some beginner trees that you style to get your collection started, and you will thoroughly enjoy all the stories and history about bonsai and bonsai people that you will hear.

For those of you who have taken the beginner classes and now need some help moving your trees forward with details about styling and care, consider signing up for the workshops that begin on Saturday afternoons, starting on September 24. SHOHIN BONSAI FEATURE OF THE MONTH



Shohin Bonsai, Mixed Varieties I debated with myself, should I comment or shouldn't I comment on this, but I couldn't let it go by, because it is created by a young upand-coming Japanese bonsai artist. It is popular right now, all around the world, to try new and more contemporary bonsai styles and displays. Some of them work and some of them don't. I tend to be more old school, and the focus is always on the tree first. That's not the case in this example, one of a half a dozen I have seen by this artist with the same approach. I have a number of problems with this creation. Overall it's very busy and confusing to look at, you don't know what tree to look at first, your eye is too busy bouncing around trying to make sense of the composition of multiple trees and busy display. It makes it difficult, if not impossible to focus on one tree. It is totally off balance and looks ready to fall over. I will admit that it definitely is creative, but that doesn't always mean good, an important point I would like to make. Harvey Carapella
